...we are cutting AU Grazer hay here on our farm in Missouri at this very moment. I will be taking AU Grazer hay to convention for my sale goats and will make sure everyone knows what it is! We have been blessed with an abundance of rainfall this spring, but if it weren't for the AU Grazer during the past two years of drought, we would have really been hurting....or at least our stock would have been. In the extreme drought of 2011 & 2012, the AU Grazer was our only hay crop that made and provided any quality nutrition to our stock. During those two years of drought, we were only able to get one cutting of hay, but did graze the AU Grazer field some in the late summer. While ponds were going dry and grass fields burning up and turning brown, the AU Grazer was the only thing green on the whole farm, except for the leaves on the trees. We primarily raise Kikos, but have a few dairy goats also. The dairy goats produced on the AU Grazer just as well as if they had alfalfa and there is much less labor and cost in maintaining the AU Grazer than the alfalfa. We have also noticed when feeding the AU Grazer hay, there is very little waste.
